AUTISM STATISTICS THAT DRIVE OUR WORK

PREVALENCE

Autism affects all ethnic and socio-economic groups. Autism is the fastest- growing developmental disability (CDC, 2020)

Prevalence of autism has **tripled** over the last 20 years in children (.67% to 1.85%) Approximately **1 in 54** children in the U.S. diagnosed *(CDC, 2020)* Boys are **4 times** more likely to be diagnosed with autism than girls: **1 in 34 boys** (2.97%) **1 in 144 girls** (0.69%) 2.21% of adults are living with autism

CHALLENGES AND EDUCATION

\$13,187; while the average cost to educate a student with ASD is nearly \$21,000. On average, autism costs an estimated **\$60,000** a year through childhood, with the bulk of the costs in special services and lost wages related to increased demands on one or both parents.

AUTISM IN ADULTHOOD

An estimated **707,000** to **1,116,000** teens are expected to age out of school-based autism services by 2030. **50%** of young adults with autism remain unemployed, a lower rate than that of young adults in other disability categories. Nearly **40%** of adults with autism spend little or no time with friends, indicating little or no opportunities for community or social activities. Of the nearly **18,000** people with autism who used state-funded vocational rehabilitation programs in 2014, only 60% left the program with a job. Of these, 80% worked part-time at a median weekly rate of \$160, putting them well below the poverty level.

AVONDALE HOUSE SERVES ADULTS

Adult services at Avondale House includes a robust adult day hab program, four adult residential group homes and Employment Services. The Adult Day Hab Program is a safe environment for adults ages 22 and up who need support and training throughout their day. The program provides daily living skills, community and volunteer outings and vocational training.

Licensed by the Health and Human Services Commission, the residential services of Avondale House are provided in supportive family-style environments for adults unable to reside independently or with a family member. Residents enjoy daily living skills and independence training, structured recreation, medical management and pride in their home.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, nearly 34% of working age people with disabilities are in the labor force compared to 76% of people without disabilities. In response, Avondale House serves individuals on the autism spectrum and with intellectual and developmental disabilities who need assistance finding competitive employment. In partnership with the Texas Workforce Commission, our program provides job placement, supported employment and job skills training across multiple industries in the greater Houston area.


